Here's what you need to know before
you board your cruise:



Research your destinations at
[*travel.state.gov/destination*](https://travel.state.gov/destination).



Always bring your **passport** in case of an
emergency, even if your cruise says you won't
need it.



Make sure you have the right foreign visas for
all of your stops, even if you do not plan to
disembark.



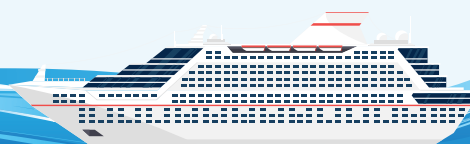
Enroll in our Smart Traveler Enrollment
Program (STEP) at [**step.state.gov**](https://step.state.gov) to get
important travel and safety updates.



Get insurance coverage for medical,
emergency evacuation, and other unexpected
expenses while abroad.



Check with your doctor to see if you should
travel. If you take any **prescription/OTC**
medications, get written prescriptions and
bring extra medication in case of delays.





Medications that are legally prescribed in the United States are not always legal abroad. Check with the destination country's embassy or consulate about local laws regarding your prescribed medicines. For more information, go to ***travel.state.gov/destination***.



Follow local laws and customs. If you break the law, you will be subject to the justice system of the host country.



Be sure to write down the phone numbers of the U.S. embassy or consulate in every country you plan to dock in, even if you don't plan to disembark.
